	Contents Plays of the Storm and Stress movement modernized German speaking theatre by the implementation of new theatrical forms beyond the poetics in the Aristotelian tradition. "Kraftkerls" (Strong guys) and "Bösewichter" (villains) were now entering the stage – figures who do not seem to fit into the traditional Aristotelian scheme of a 'mixed character'. New subjects and topics which deal with conflicts of sexual morals or individual lack of freedom became popular. The course introduces substantial plays of the Storm and Stress: "Götz of Berlichingen" (1773) by Johann Wolfgang Goethe, "The Tutor" (1774) by Jakob Michael Reinhold Lenz, "The Child Murderess" (1776) by Heinrich Leopold Wagner and Friedrich Schiller's "The Robbers" (1781). This course is especially suitable for International Students. Course language is German (recommended level: B1).

	Contents Based on the analysis of the selected dramas of the Storm and Stress, this exercise is intended to develop an intercultural view of dramas, methods of analysis and theatre by not only focusing the commonly used 'internal perspective' but first and foremost, on the 'external perspective'. This initially means an introduction to theoretical texts on interculturality in general as well as on alterity in particular. Additionally, we will get to know different theatrical traditions and history/ histories, various performance practices, forms of reception and adaptation in a comparative perspective. This course is especially suitable for International Students. Course language is German (recommended level: B1).
